







The Georgia Forestry Commission

Georgia Forestry Act 1921, renamed GFC in 1949

Vision: Healthy, sustainable forests providing clean air, clean water and abundant products for future generations

Mission: To provide leadership, service and education in the protection and conservation of Georgia's forest resources

Forestry economic impact: \$42 billion

Community Forestry \$6 billion

Urban and Community Forestry Program

- Mainly work through municipalities
 - Municipal Staff
 - General Public
- Training/Education
- New Resources
- Tree Ordinances
- Disaster Response
- Green Infrastructure
- Industry Certification



Population Density Increase in GA




- GA population 11 million
- 2030: 11,764,473
- 2040: 12,786,367
- 2060: 14,147,873
- Dawson and Lumpkin tied for 3rd fastest growing counties in the nation

Georgia's Growth Through 2010



3 of Top 10 growth counties in US since 2000:

•Forsyth •Paulding •Henry

•From 9MM to 12MM by 2030

Suburban/WUI Canopy Loss

- Need for affordable housing can be in conflict with trees
- Development pressure
- Need to factor wildfire into community forest risk assessments



Conflicting Values Can Lead to Risk



- Almost 45

 million
 housing units
 in the WUI
- GA Top 4 in the nation units in WUI

What Can We Do? Current Tools

- FireWise
- Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPP's)
- Fuel mitigation
 - Rx fire or mechanical
- A lot of times comes down to individual responsibility



Wildfire Risk Reduction Qualification

- New Qualification through ISA
 - Currently only adopted by GA and TX ISA Chapters
- Education for community foresters managing communities in/near WUI
- Training for "value added" services for commercial arborists
- Builds off of established fire prevention techniques
 - FireWise
 - Fire Adapted Landscaping



Energy Saving Trees vs Defensible Space



Tree Risk Assessment is always a balancing act, how do we reconcile this conflict of our values to encourage trees to shade homes and reduce wildfire risk? Larger lots? Housing cluster ordinances?

- Certified Arborist preferred, but not required
- 2- Day Course
 - Travel?
- Registration Costs
 - GAA
- 50 Question Written Exam
- Field Exam

WRRQ Take Aways
