 Savannah Georgia's trees provide a cornerstone of the City's green infrastructure, playing a key part in managing water that inundates the area during coastal storms. As Savannah has grown, it has lost portions of its urban forest to development and extreme weather events. The City developed the Green Infrastructure to Green Jobs pilot project, converting underutilized vacant properties into urban tree nurseries. The intent is to use this project to engage educate residents on the value of trees, develop technical tree skills in our rising workforce, and to grow Savannah's urban forest. The work is supported by the Southeastern Sustainable Communities Fund.
